

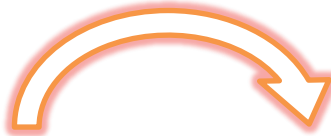

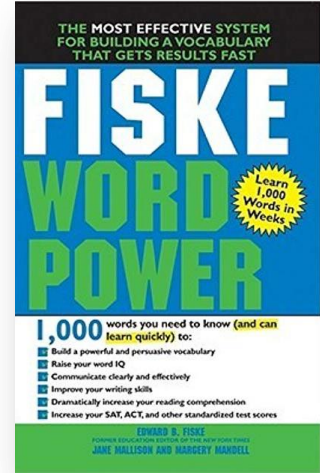
# Summer Reading

1. Read and annotate pages 1-11 of *Fiske's Word Power*
2. Take the diagnostic quiz on pages 12-13
3. **100 points:** Read **one of the novels below (see back for more details)** and record **ten** words from the text with which you are unfamiliar. For each entry, do the following (**see format below**):
  - a. Provide the page number where the word appears in the novel.
  - b. Write the word and the dictionary definition. *Note: Choose the definition that fits the context provided by the text, not just the shortest or most common definition.*
  - c. Write down the quote in which the word appears.
  - d. Evaluate whether or not you think the word is a good choice for that particular context. Make sure to defend your reasoning.
  - e. Write your own sentence with context clues proving understanding of the usage of the word.
4. **100 points:** There will be an in class assessment on the novel you choose from the list below.

The following books were chosen based on many criteria, including reading level, content, interest, and more.

 <p><i>Rebecca</i></p>	Daphne du Maurier	Fiction - Gothic Mystery	With these words, the reader is ushered into an isolated gray stone mansion on the windswept Cornish coast, as the second Mrs. Maxim de Winter recalls the chilling events that transpired as she began her new life as the young bride of a husband she barely knew. For in every corner of every room were phantoms of a time dead but not forgotten—a past devotedly preserved by the sinister housekeeper, Mrs. Danvers: a suite immaculate and untouched, clothing laid out and ready to be worn, but not by any of the great house's current occupants. With an eerie presentiment of evil tightening her heart, the second Mrs. de Winter walked in the shadow of her mysterious predecessor, determined to uncover the darkest secrets and shattering truths about Maxim's first wife—the late and hauntingly beautiful Rebecca.
 <p><i>Ophelia</i></p>	Lisa Klein	Fiction - Young Adult	He is Hamlet, Prince of Denmark; she is simply Ophelia. If you think you know their story, think again. In this reimagining of Shakespeare's famous tragedy, it is Ophelia who takes center stage. A rowdy, motherless girl, she grows up at Elsinore Castle to become the queen's most trusted lady-in-waiting. Ambitious for knowledge and witty as well as beautiful, Ophelia learns the ways of power in a court where nothing is as it seems. When she catches the attention of the captivating, dark-haired Prince Hamlet, their love blossoms in secret. But bloody deeds soon turn Denmark into a place of madness, and Ophelia's happiness is shattered. Ultimately, she must choose between her love for Hamlet and her own life. In desperation, Ophelia devises a treacherous plan to escape from Elsinore forever . . . with one very dangerous secret.
 <p><i>Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde</i></p>	Robert Louis Stevenson	Fiction - Psychological Thriller/Suspense	<i>The Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde</i> is about a London lawyer named Gabriel John Utterson who investigates strange occurrences between his old friend, Dr. Henry Jekyll, and the evil Edward Hyde. The work is commonly associated with the rare mental condition often spuriously called "split personality", referred to in psychiatry as dissociative identity disorder, where within the same body there exists more than one distinct personality. In this case, there are two personalities within Dr. Jekyll, one apparently good and the other evil; completely opposite levels of morality.
 <p><i>Wuthering Heights</i></p>	Emily Bronte	Fiction - Gothic Romance	<i>Wuthering Heights</i> is a wild, passionate story of the intense love between Catherine Earnshaw and Heathcliff, a foundling adopted by Catherine's father. After Mr Earnshaw's death, Heathcliff is bullied and humiliated by Catherine's brother Hindley and wrongly believing that his love for Catherine is not reciprocated, leaves Wuthering Heights, only to return years later as a wealthy and polished man. He proceeds to exact a terrible revenge for his former miseries. The action of the story is chaotic and unremittingly violent, but the accomplished handling of a complex structure, the evocative descriptions of the lonely moorland setting and the poetic grandeur of vision combine to make this unique novel a masterpiece of English literature.
 <p><i>David Copperfield</i></p>	Charles Dickens	Fiction - Artist's Growth to Maturity	<i>David Copperfield</i> is the story of a young man's adventures on his journey from an unhappy and impoverished childhood to the discovery of his vocation as a successful novelist. Among the gloriously vivid cast of characters he encounters are his tyrannical stepfather, Mr. Murdstone; his formidable aunt, Betsey Trotwood; the eternally humble yet treacherous Uriah Heep; frivolous, enchanting Dora; and the magnificently impecunious Micawber, one of literature's great comic creations. In <i>David Copperfield</i> —the novel he described as his "favorite child"—Dickens drew revealingly on his own experiences to create one of his most exuberant and enduringly popular works, filled with tragedy and comedy in equal measure.
